The Aurora Parks and Open Space System is a varied system of open space, trails, natural areas, golf courses, and reservoirs, comprising over 8,000 acres within the city of Aurora.

Open Space provides essential habitat for humans and wildlife. We invite you to explore your local open space system and discover Aurora's true nature.

You can find five major ecosystems in Aurora:

- **Shortgrass prairie:** Plains Conservation Center and Aurora Reservoir
- **Lowland riparian:** Sand Creek, Star K Ranch, Coal Creek Arena, Piney Creek, and High Line Canal
- **Ponderosa pine savannah:** Ponderosa Preserve (guided tours only), and Kestrel Point
- **Urban/developed:** Aurora golf courses, Sports Park, Great Plains Park, and your backyard

This unique and varied mix of ecosystems makes Aurora a great place to watch wildlife. Use this basic checklist as a general guide for wildlife sightings in and around the city.
