7. **PUBLIC INVITED TO BE HEARD (non-agenda related issues only)**

Dr. Brien Hodges, Aurora, Colorado, expressed concerns related to the intersection at South Tallyn’s Reach Road and Arapahoe Road. He discussed the safety factors and sight impediments at the intersection and asked City Council to do their due diligence to mitigate the issue.

Council Member Bergan stated she spoke with the Public Works Director to initiate a Council request to study the intersection.

Anthony Chad Robinson, Aurora, Colorado, stated concerns related to the animal control laws and lack of traffic control within the City of Aurora. He discussed the frustration he experienced when reporting animal abuse to the Aurora Animal Shelter and while driving in the City. He asked the City Council to review the animal control laws and to consider putting in speeding cameras around the City that could be paid for with revenue collected from traffic tickets.

Mayor Hogan agreed there would be discussion amongst council members next year regarding the budget and traffic safety in the City and asked Mr. Robinson to speak with Jason Batchelor, Deputy City Manager, who was in charge of the animal shelter.

Celina Mendoza, Aurora, Colorado, raised the topic of the City of Aurora’s policies and asked what policies were in place to protect people impacted by the Sanctuary Cities policies.

Mayor Hogan pointed out the City of Aurora’s policies on the matter were the same as those put into effect six years ago. He stated Aurora Police officers were not federal officers and therefore did not stop people to ask for papers to prove their residency. He explained the detention facility in Aurora was a 72-hour facility and those who were detained there were arrested and fingerprinted. He noted the fingerprints were then shared with the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI) who may send them to the Immigration and Customs Enforcement. (ICE)

Ms. Mendoza asked what protection policies were in place if the Federal Government were to conduct a sweep or raid in the City. Mayor Hogan stated that was the purview of the administration and federal courts and not the city or state.

Council Member LeGare encouraged Ms. Mendoza to access the City Council Study Session backup materials from the March 27, 2017 meeting for more details on the matter.

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Maria Guerrero, Aurora, Colorado, continued the discussion of Sanctuary Cities and discussed the pervasive fear in the community related to immigration and asked how people were being informed that nothing has changed in Aurora as a result of the new administration.

Mayor Hogan stated there have been ongoing efforts over the last six weeks to put out a strong, fair message to all parts of the community that the City's policies have not changed and that everyone's public safety was the City Council's utmost concern. He suggested those with questions should send them in because many of the council members and City staff would be happy to answer them.

Council Member Bergan reiterated Council Member LeGare's comments regarding the study session backup material presented by the Aurora Chief of Police and others that went through what the City did and why on this matter.

Ihoby Rakotomalala, Aurora, Colorado, asked if the information on the City website has been translated into other languages. Council Member Bergan stated it has been translated into at least six languages. Ms. Rakotomalala asked if the information was distributed to local schools and discussed the need for diversity engagement in the City.

Council Member Cleland stated the City had an Immigrant & Refugee Commission that had the charge of finding different ways to work with immigrants and refugees in Aurora and suggested Ms. Rakotomalala get in touch with the commission in that regard.

Council Member Roth stated the City of Aurora was a member government of Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG), noting DRCOG recently recognized the Aurora Natural Helpers Program with the Metro Vision award. He discussed the Natural Helpers program and pointed out the Aurora Welcome Center was another good resource.

Carla Castedo, Mi Familia Vota (MFV), discussed MFV's mission to increase civic participation and raised the topic of Aurora being a welcoming city rather than a sanctuary city as introduced recently in a draft resolution. She stated diverse communities were very much in fear and listed ways such as having no ICE holds, notification or data collection and creating honor sensitive areas and an immigrant new defense fund, that the City could further the goal of being a welcoming city. She asked everyone present in support of Sanctuary Cities to stand.

Mayor Hogan estimated approximately 25 – 30 people were standing.

Council Member Cleland pointed out the City of Aurora had a detention facility and not a jail, and everyone who was arrested went to the facility. She explained the reason their fingerprints were then sent to CBI was to determine if they had any outstanding warrants and it was up to the CBI if the fingerprints were then sent on to ICE.

Mayor Pro Tem Lawson stated she was the one who made the statement through the proposed resolution that the City of Aurora was not a Sanctuary City. She noted she has been inundated with calls and emails in that regard. She stated she was not anti-immigrant and was simply stating the truth and following federal law. She explained the resolution was not law and would be reviewed by a policy committee for a recommendation. She pointed out she was standing firm in this regard because doing so prevented the City from losing vital federal funding for police and fire, which was in the interest of everyone's safety.

Council Member Bergan referenced Council Member Cleland's comments regarding government information-sharing and stated the goal of the Aurora City Council and City employees was to make Aurora a safe city. She pointed out that being in compliance with 8 U.S.C. 1373, which was required by the Federal Government, meant keeping criminals off of City streets.

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Leslie Martinez, Aurora, Colorado read a letter from Laura Peniche-Rojales, Aurora, Colorado, who had taken a vow of silence, that discussed Ms. Peniche-Rojales' journey and experience as an undocumented immigrant and asked the City Council to reassess their position on being a Sanctuary City.

Patricia Ferrero, Aurora, Colorado, discussed the importance of the City of Aurora remaining a Sanctuary City.

Monica Martinez-Vargas, Aurora, Colorado, discussed through an interpreter, Hilda Nucete, Program Director, Our Air, Our Health, Conservation Colorado, the importance of allowing English Second Language (ESL) citizens to have their testimony translated in civic meetings and the importance of civic engagement for immigrants and refugees through translation and safety.

Keith Johnson, Aurora, Colorado, agreed with the need for interpreter support and the 72-hour holding policy because it kept everyone in the community safe.

Jonathan Huie, Spring Institute for Intercultural Learning, expressed congratulations to the City for being recognized with the City Diversity award for their efforts in inclusion. He asked why it was necessary to change Aurora's status from sanctuary city to welcoming city when there was not a legal definition of Sanctuary City.

Mayor Pro Tem Lawson suggested that her interpretation was being twisted. She explained the resolution included language that the immigrant community was valued and that the safety of every citizen was of the utmost importance.

Mr. Huie suggested the resolution had the appearance of weaker language that stepped the City away and back from supporting the immigrant community. He raised the topic of profiling and asked if a person who was arrested in the City of Aurora could have their information given to ICE.

Mayor Hogan answered affirmatively. He clarified a person who broke the law, was arrested and sent to the detention center would have their fingerprints sent to CBI but not someone who was issued a ticket. He pointed out that was the same in every city in the state and the only difference was that the City of Aurora had a 72-hour detention facility. He reiterated the policy has not changed since its implementation six years ago.

Mr. Huie restated his concern regarding profiling those in the immigrant community.

Council Members Bergan and Cleland stated the City did not profile.

Mr. Huie asked if there were any measures in place to prevent profiling. Council Member Cleland reiterated the City did not profile and suggested Mr. Huie speak with Michelle Wolfe, Deputy City Manager in that regard.

Council Member Pierce read the NLC award which recognized the City for its implementation of programs that enhanced cultural diversity in their communities. He pointed out all City Council Study Sessions could be found online and suggested Mr. Huie could review the comprehensive discussion the City Council had recently regarding Sanctuary Cities. He stated the City did not profile and everyone who was arrested in the City was treated the same.

Motion by Roth, second by Peterson, to approve item 10b.

Chad Argentar, Economic & Business Development Supervisor, Planning and Development Services, provided a brief summary of the item, noting it related to an incentive of \$1.184M taken primarily from use taxes provided to Amazon for the leasing and operation of a fulfillment center that would employ 1000 full-time positions within two years of opening.

Council Member LeGare asked for an explanation of the economic benefit to the City.

Yuriy Gorlov, Vice-President, Aurora Economic Development Council, did so, noting the total tax revenue for the project was in excess of \$6.5M.

Council Member Roth pointed out the incentives did not mean that the City was writing a check to anyone; it meant that the taxes generated from the project would not exist if the project did not exist. He clarified the incentives would give a portion of the taxes back to the business so that the project would come to the City of Aurora.

Council Member Pierce noted the importance of recognizing that the total revenue generated by the project was \$6.5M so the City would receive approximately \$5.1M.

Motion by Peterson, second by Bergan, to introduce item 11a.

Duane Senn, Aurora, Colorado, Laredo Highline Neighborhood Association, spoke in support of moving the item forward to the voters for their review and decision. He provided a brief summary of City Council's compensation and retirement program.

Council Member Roth asked Mr. Senn if travel expenses were included in the figures he presented. Mr. Senn answered no. Council Member Roth pointed out Mr. Senn's statement that City Council's base salary would double if travel allowances were included assumed a council member would use all of their travel allowances each year and that was not always the case.

Council Member LeGare stated his belief that someone who wanted a raise should ask their employer for one and suggested anyone living in Aurora for a year could run for office.

Council Member Bergan agreed it was awkward to ask for a pay increase from the voters and noted this request had not been brought to the voters since 1993.

Council Member Berzins stated she would not support the item because the real question was whether or not the City charter should be reconsidered to make the council member position a full-time position rather than a part-time position. She pointed out the job of a council member required a servant's heart and as such, was more than a full-time job. She suggested the item be sent to committee for review because increasing salaries would just be a small fix.

Council Member Mounier concurred, noting her opinion that the Mayor's position should be making more than \$80k per year and suggested a salary of \$120k would be more appropriate. She stated she worked 50 hours a week, seven days a week and she did so because she had a servant's heart. She stated a raise in salary was not the way to deal with the issue and agreed the question was whether a full-time City Council was needed rather than a part-time City Council that worked full-time.

Council Member Cleland concurred, noting the actual charter verbiage did not state City Council worked part-time. She discussed the workload of Ward Council Members versus At-Large Council Members and suggested the charter be reviewed.

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12. **PLANNING MATTERS**

- a. Public Hearing to consider an appeal of the Planning Commission's decision to deny a Site Plan for a two-story, 3,300 square-foot restaurant and office building on a 0.15 acre located on the north side of Colfax Avenue approximately 120 feet west of Kingston Street (East Colfax Restaurant). STAFF SOURCE: Sarah Wieder, Planner II, Planning & Development Services

Mayor Hogan opened the public hearing on the item.

Sarah Wieder, Planner II, Planning & Development Services, provided a presentation on the item, noting it related to an appeal request of the recent Planning Commission denial decision for a site plan approval. She noted the main reason stated for the denial was lack of parking and the applicant has asked for appeal consideration because the project met all construction requirements and would improve the overall site. She stated staff found the project consistent with the goals of the Comprehensive Plan and the Original Aurora area.

Council Member Bergan asked staff for an update on the applicant's proposal to negotiate a parking agreement with nearby churches. Ms. Wieder stated the applicant's representative met with the adjacent church representatives who stated an interest in a parking agreement discussion, noting an agreement had not been reached at this time.

Council Member Pierce asked the required number of parking spaces. Ms. Weider stated approximately 12 parking spaces were required for the site, noting there was a provision within the Colfax Street Overlay District that allowed the parking requirement to be modified due to existing conditions so the number was reduced without a waiver.

Council Member Bergan asked if the proposal included a sign waiver request. Ms. Weider answered affirmatively, noting the Overlay District did not allow for projection signs but due to the limited frontage, the applicant requested a small projection sign that was well below the allowable signage area.

Council Member LeGare asked if the existing building would be expanded. Ms. Weider answered affirmatively. Council Member LeGare asked staff to speak to the plan for the existing telephone poles. Ms. Weider stated the poles would be relocated to make room for the parking spaces and landscaping.

Eric Blase, representing the applicant, gave a presentation of the item that included the site history and specific challenges.

Eduardo Zeneda, representing the applicant, provided a brief summary of the item.

Council Member LeGare asked if preservation of a portion of the building was required by City code. Mr. Blase answered no, noting City staff suggested it would be easier to do so from an energy code standpoint. He added saving the foundation would also reduce shoring costs and ease of construction, if feasible. Council Member LeGare asked if the existing building had a basement. Mr. Blase answered affirmatively, noting the basement would be preserved for the new building. Council Member LeGare asked if the applicant would be required to underground some of the powerlines. Mr. Blase answered affirmatively.

Council Member Bergan expressed appreciation to Mr. Blase for his presentation and to the applicant for bringing their business expertise to the City. She asked if a second floor for the building was proposed. Mr. Blase answered affirmatively, noting the second floor would be used for business operations.

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Council Member Richardson asked Council Member Mounier to speak to the item as the Ward Council Member. Council Member Mounier stated her support of the item, noting the building was beautiful and would be a real improvement to that part of Colfax.

Mayor Hogan closed the public hearing on the item.

Motion by Cleland, second by Mounier, to approve item 12a.

Council Member Cleland stated the project provided an opportunity to do some nice things on Colfax, noting the project was creative for a very challenging site.

Council Member Roth stated his support for the item, noting the City had been working to attract businesses to this area and he was not concerned about the parking issues because they were common in any downtown area. He expressed disappointment that anyone would base their decision on whether or not the business would be successful, noting it was the role of the Planning Commission and the City Council to review the facts and make a sound decision, not decipher a business plan.

Council Member LeGare stated there was no question that this project would be a phenomenal improvement for the Colfax corridor, noting parking would not be an issue if the business was successful because people would park where they could. He expressed appreciation to the applicant for their significant investment in the area and wished them good luck.

Council Member Peterson noted she usually sided with the Planning Commission but would support the item in this instance because it had the support of the Ward Council Member.

Council Member Pierce stated his support of the item.

Council Member Bergan expressed appreciation to Lieutenant Lori Bridges, Public Information Officer and Lieutenant Brett Parvin, Executive Officer to the Chief of Police, Aurora Police, for their attendance and presentation at the recent Ward VI Town Hall meeting and to all those involved in the planning and success of the Fire and Police Training Facility tour.

Council Member Roth announced the Ward V Town Hall meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, April 18, 2017 at Shalom Cares from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., where the Parks and Rec Department (PROS) would provide a presentation and the annual budget would be discussed.

Council Member Pierce announced the National Mayor's Challenge for Water Conservation was going on from April 1 through April 30 and requested everyone go to www.auroragov.org/challenge to make their pledge to conserve water. He noted the City of Aurora previously won this challenge two years in a row.
