Monday, February 26, 2024

1. **RECONVENE REGULAR MEETING OF FEBRUARY 26, 2024, AND CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Coffman reconvened the regular meeting of the City Council for February 26, 2024, at 6:30 p.m.

Public call-in instructions were provided in both English and Spanish.

3. **INVOCATION/MOMENT OF SILENCE**

Mayor Coffman led the prayer for the February 26, 2024 Council Meeting.

Mayor Coffman read a land acknowledgment.

Mayor Coffman provided an update on the Executive Session where they went over personnel matters, litigation matters, and contract matters.

Mayor Coffman noted that he would be bringing forward a resolution that indicates that council will focus on the business at hand that they have jurisdiction on.

CM Murillo informed the public the call for the question is to shut down all council comment.

Mayor Coffman added it was a nondebatable motion.

CM Coombs stated the motion was not made prior to public invited to heard on agenda items and was an issue that directly impacts the Aurora community and people's ability to access justice.

Motion by Coombs, second by Murillo, to reopen public comment on non-agenda items for an additional hour to allow the people who came to speak the opportunity.

CM Bergan commented the motion as unprecedented because they closed public invited already. Mayor Coffman agreed it was unprecedented.

CM Coombs argued it was also unprecedented to remove items without the consent of the sponsor when backup and resolution have been provided in advance.

CM Gardner said that was not unprecedented, because they did that last year when going through funding for nonprofit organizations. He stated this item has been debated and the RFP they were working on will give opportunity in the future for further comments.

CM Murillo disagreed with the move to not allow them to speak and the premise of the sponsor to bring it forward was to call into question the process the council voted on and was their right to do so. She added they should not be limiting public comment and asked when do they draw the line on deciding what is allowable.

CM Coombs added there were many people there to speak that have not had the opportunity to address the council on the issue.

Mayor Coffman called for the question.

Council heard public comment on the agenda item.

Motion by Jurinsky, second by Sundberg to approve 11.a.3.

Motion by Zvonek, second by Sundberg, to strike the portion of section one starting at "For temporary housing without the City first being given an opportunity..." and pick back up where it says, "We call on the federal government..." as an amended motion.

CM Jurinsky stated she would accept that amendment and found other cities bussing people into Aurora to be inhumane. She said a lot of times they did not know when they were coming, where they are going, and did not have the funds to sustain it. She added the resolution does not say they would not accept any migrants.

CM Sundberg commented America is a beacon of light to a good number of the world and stated his wife was an immigrant from Africa, but the resolution was about what is fair, humane, compassionate, and a realistic fiscal responsibility. He quoted a statement by the Mayor of Colorado Springs, who is also an immigrant, stating they were empathetic to the people coming in but did not have the resources to host that population. He stated Denver is also strained in taking in so many people. He commended the Office of Immigrant Affairs for doing an excellent job and setting a high standard in their process and goals. CM Sundberg expressed Aurora simply did not have the housing and were simply stating to their citizens that they have a fiscal responsibility and their resources are limited.

CM Bergan explained the resolution was about their resources. She said they have a lot of needs in the city and hear from constituents every day on those and they did not have the resources to offer services to migrants crossing the southern border. She expressed they love their migrant community and were a welcoming city, but this resolution was not about that. She stated they need to prioritize effectively and make sure money would be going to things to vowed to take care of.

CM Lawson explained the resolution was about coordination and being fiscally responsible. She discussed the responsibility to work on housing the homeless they already have, neighborhoods, roads, and only had so much money. She expressed they did not want to take away services from people by taking in more than they can provide for. She talked about services being cut in Denver because of this issue and did not want that for Aurora. She said it was about coordination and making sure they have the financial means to help their city maintain a good quality of life. She added it was ridiculous to say they were being racist by supporting this resolution.

CM Hancock said the resolution did not say anything about prohibiting nonprofit organizations or groups to assist migrants and homeless and to say the council is against migrants, the homeless, and veterans was ridiculous. She explained the resolution simply states they need to be good stewards of their resources. She stated it was not a racist issue and do not make it one. CM Hancock expressed the principle was for government to protect individual rights and the right to be a citizen of the community.

CM Jurinsky stated they have prioritized youth violence because it was a huge problem and many residents of Denver have said they were concerned about where their kids would go after school to stay off the streets due to things like rec centers and other taxpayer owned facilities being shut down. She expressed they did not want the same for Aurora. CM Jurinsky noted that the

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resolution does not inhibit the ability for non-profit organizations and churches to assist these groups, and pointed out that the most inhumane thing that can continue to happen is to bus individuals to a city that has indicated that they don't have the resources to help them.

CM Murillo said she did not support the premise of the resolution at all. She pointed out in the original draft it said, "we demand" and that did not feel like a friendly "what's up" to a municipal neighbor. She is concerned it is spreading a narrative of fear that they are pitting groups of marginalized communities and people in need against one another and did not want to send that message. She agrees the feds need to be stepping up and there is not enough being done at that level and urged them to do something about it. She added this resolution was a choice made and not a position they had to take, and the language she reads in the resolution does not match the intent she's hearing the other councilors say. She is concerned that this item creates signals of fear and doubt to the non-profit or private organizations that the government may try to interfere with their ability to do their work.

CM Bergan pointed out Denver made 15% cuts across all departments and told their residents they could not even go in person to the DMV anymore. She said this definitely affects residents lives and the budget, so the resolution needed to happen. She stated their own residents were their priority and needed to take care of them first.

CM Jurinsky stated the resolution does say "we demand" because saying please in this situation would not work, but constituents are telling her people are being bussed into the city in the middle of the night and just dropped off in neighborhoods and that is inhumane. She said, therefore, she is going to say "we demand" they stop being inhumane and dropping people off wherever and at whatever time of day.

CM Murillo said she was confused and asked if they were demanding or being friendly to their neighborhoods about what is going on here. She said the message between the lines is clear. She did commend some of the changes that were made but remembers where it started.

CM Sundberg said the current version did not have the word demand in it. He explained the original did,, but that is why they take things to committee to hash things out.

CM Coombs thanked the sponsors for making changes to the resolutions and listening to concerns about the original draft, but the political posturing in the whereas clauses are still problematic, including the statements on sanctuary. She said immigrants living in the city are telling them they are wrong. She stated it sends a bad precedent to say they accept the immigrants they already have but did not want to accept new ones. She said they should listen to their own immigrants because they know better than they do.

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CM Bergan stated she has heard from other immigrants that agree with the resolution.

CM Jurinsky expressed a lot of the changes from the original form came from nonprofits, people working with immigrants and migrants, and were all taken into consideration, and now they have their support. She also said several immigrants are very upset about what is currently going on because for them to come over here, they had to find someone to sponsor them, have a job lined, up, get a workers permit, or even wait years for it. She thanked the support from the nonprofits for adding input to change the resolution to help highlight the point they were trying to make, that it is inhumane to bus people into this city knowing they do not have the resources to help them.

CM Medina stated he sits on multiple boards of immigrants and they need to watch how they word things, because he has had some nonprofits asked if they need to move out of Aurora because of the resolution. He said they felt they did not want immigrants there at all. He added they were not asking for funding and know they cannot get any. He explained they needed to watch how they frame things because they mean one thing but it is not conveyed correctly to people in the community.

13.a Retail Theft Repeat Offenders

2024-04 FOR AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AURORA, COLORADO, AMENDING SECTIONS OF THE CITY CODE PERTAINING TO MANDATORY

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MINIMUM SENTENCES FOR RETAIL THEFT IN THE AURORA MUNICIPAL CODE TO CONTINUE TO COMBAT THEFTS IN THE CITY

The Council heard public comment on the agenda item.

Pete Schulte provided a summary of the item.

CM Bergan asked if punitive measures work for the low-level offenses.

P. Schulte stated there were some Department of Justice studies done that on some of the offense, such as murders, other serious offense, mandatory minimums do not work, because people capable of those crimes are going to do it regardless of the punishment, but there was evidence that on low level property crimes, a mandatory minimum sentence of jail time can deter some criminal activity.

CM Murillo asked for clarification on if there was any data that refutes that point and evidence.

P. Schulte said the only evidence he had was when they had this discussion almost two years ago on motor vehicle theft with CM Marcano.

CM Murillo asked if he was just speaking about a conversation had with a past council member.

Mr. Schulte explained that study was something discussed in a council meeting but did not have it in front of him right now.

CM Murillo asked if that is what he was referring to by evidence and data.

Mr. Schulte responded.

CM Murillo again asked if he was aware of any other body of data suggesting mandatory minimums do not work.

Mr. Schulte answered not that he was aware of but could do more research on it if necessary.

CM Murillo said she assumed that was part of the preparation for the conversation and would like to work with him on that.

CM Coombs explained there was a lot of conversation on the impact of their jail costs, and they received information showing they were not providing any money for the 10 beds per night they currently have held opened in Arapahoe County Jail. She asked what the cost per bed is for the Arapahoe County Jail if they were to exceed the 10 beds or if they were to change the current arrangement.

Mr. Schulte said the argument was that since all the citizens in Aurora were paying taxes, that they were already paying for a certain number of beds. He said he has talked to the sheriff a lot about this, and he said depending on how many individuals the ordinances produce with a jail sentence, he may have to revisit it later. He also estimated about \$135 to house anyone in the jail for one day.

CM Coombs asked if they had heard from Adams County yet on the cost.

Mr. Schulte stated he thinks they are mostly sending individuals to Arapahoe County.

CM Coombs expressed she had seen a jail mittimus for Adams County for Aurora, so some were going there, and she heard from both Adams and Arapahoe County jail commissioners that the jails are in bad conditions, overcrowded, and cannot afford to take in Aurora cases. She believes they would need to hear from the counties by the second reading since there is no direct information available from them at this point.

Mr. Schulte said he asked Sheriff Brown to bring that information, but they have not provided their office with it yet. He said they had not started charging yet, but it could happen at some point. He also explained that current mandatory minimum for shoplifting is three days, but if they have other charges they would be transferred to the jail where they had other charges pending.

Motion by CM Jurinsky, second by Zvonek, to approve 13.a.

CM Bergan stated the whole point is to deter people from stealing from their businesses and that is a good thing. She added if you don't steal, you won't go to jail.

CM Zvonek said they heard a lot about the cost of the ordinance but were forgetting about the cost to the businesses. He added there have been several retail businesses in the city considering leaving because of the high rate of retail theft, and this was their opportunity to crack down on it and not lose those businesses and any future businesses.

CM Coombs expressed part of the conversation not being had was the fact of having to catch people before they can be sentenced. She said if the officers did not have the resources or capacity when called by residents to report crimes then it does not matter how many mandatory minimums they put on the record. She talked about the RFP to outsource their public defender's office to a low bid flat fee contract or a requirement to have change orders to increase the cost of that contract when the cases are more than what they told them they were going to be. She explained when you say more people can go to jail for crimes, you entitle them to a public defender and the caseload number in the RFP will be inaccurate. CM Coombs expressed they needed to tie together the different issues they are addressing or refusing to address.

CM Sundberg pledged to the citizens to keep the fight alive and decide what they are going to be permissive of. He said they had an opportunity to go another route than to be permissive of things in Aurora.

CM Jurinsky commented this was addressing retail theft and retailers are starting to put trackers in some of the items and people are being caught. She said she thinks they have a chance in combating this.

Mayor Coffman asked for a confirmation that everything was trending down except for retail theft. Mr. Schulte confirmed that was true, that they have had a large spike in retail theft while everything else went down.

CM Hancock stated if you steal there is a consequence and when people throw off consequences and restraint you have anarchy. She said she has been hearing so much to please stop theft, and as long as people feel like they can do things with impunity then they would have chaos. She added they may not like it, but they have to teach people that citizens they need to practice self-restraint and having a conversation that they did not want to punish people for the bad things they do is mindboggling.

CM Lawson explained the businesses in Aurora are what provide revenue for their city. She expressed multiple thefts in her ward and a lot of businesses were leaving because of it. She said the theft was causing things to go up more and businesses to leave, so they have to look at it from the business owner's perspective as well.

18.a. Report by the Mayor

Mayor Coffman did not have a report.

18.b. Reports by the Council

CM Coombs stated she attended DRCOG as an alternate and had a discussion on the lobbying priorities for DRCOG and voted alongside FSIR on their positions, approved the DRCOG Priority Climate Action Plan, and appointed board members for the executive committee and subcommittees for DRCOG . She voted on appointments for the Front Range Passenger Rail Board and expressed there were not enough representatives on the board from the south and east metro, so they asked people to keep an eye out for openings. She had a meeting with Senator Hickenlooper and nonprofit and community volunteers about the migrant crisis and met with the Northwest Aurora Migrant Response Network. She said a lot was being done to get people housed and through the immigration system to have them begin working and contributing to the community. CM Coombs also attended meetings about housing, legislation, and affordability measures moving through the state legislature and fielding a lot of questions from the community on where the council stands on contentious issues. She said they needed to listen, connect, and engage with them on those issues.

CM Gardner announced the appointment of Thoa Nguyen to the Business Advisory Board.

CM Jurinsky reminded everyone they were having an at-large town hall on April 18th, at the Southeast Rec Center and an upcoming Water Wise event on May 18th, with a variety of vendors present and great opportunities to save money on water bills and have equipment installed.

CM Murillo stated her town hall will be on the fourth Thursday of the month, at 6 p.m., at the MLK Library.

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CM Sundberg said he enjoyed the Colorado Springs Rescue Mission visit and enjoyed speaking with a social studies class at Rangeview High School. He stated their Water Department and PROS Department will convert around 100 acres of ornamental grass to native grass to save on lawn mowing and water.

CM Hancock expressed she visited the Excel School opening up, which gives adults the opportunity to earn a high school diploma, located in the Goodwill Center near Chambers in her ward. She also visited the Colorado Springs Campus and stated their navigation campus will mirror that model. She stated Rangeview High School students were engaged in governance and wanted to know more about the political system and how they can be active participants in it. She announced her next town hall will be April 11th, at the Colorado Early Campus on Abilene Street, to talk about budget, safety, and other things, along with CM Jurinsky.

CM Lawson gave a legislative update from the FSIR Committee, including trying to avoid a partial shutdown, and the city will begin the process of seeking congressionally project spending for FY2025 on several projects related to safety and infrastructure. The city will also testify next week on legislation related to possession by weapons by previous offender at the state level. She announced the next FSIR meeting will be March 1st, at 1 p.m., virtual.
