CM Bergan explained that this ordinance pertains to off-highway vehicles and e-bikes that go over 28 mph, to be in alignment with our city code, as they are not street legal, and will hold parents accountable for kids riding them illegally. She added that they will also do an educational campaign on this.

Mayor Coffman noted that even if an item is covered in Study Session, there may be residents out there watching this meeting that did not watch the Study Session, so it is important to explain these things.

Officer Spanos stated that OHVs have become such a problem that every day they are hearing about constituents being hit by the e-bikes and/or accidents occurring. He noted that 60% of his phone messages and emails revolved around these electric dirt bikes. He explained that per the statute, whether electric or motorized gas, they are not permitted anywhere in the city.

Mayor Coffman asked CM Bergan to speak to the fine that could be imposed and the responsibility of parents.

CM Bergan expressed that if they did not hold the parent accountable by ticketing them, there would be no enforcement on someone under 18; therefore, they are imposing the \$250 fine. She added they have already done a lot of education outreach on social media in regard to this, but they will be expanding that educational campaign so parents are aware what is and what is not allowed.

P. Schulte said this is one of those things where they took jail time off the table for the initial offense and decided on \$250 fine for the first offense.

Staff gave a brief presentation on the item.

CM Coombs commented that it is not clear how this fee is not discriminatory toward people that need an interpreter. She said if the concern is failure to appear, they should be addressing that and assessing fees accordingly. She added that the amount of revenue raised here does not justify the impact to people being able to have access to this. She urged her colleagues to not pass an ordinance that is discriminatory.

CM Murillo expressed that she would not support this ordinance, as it is deeply concerning that this only applies to a certain amount of people in Aurora. She noted

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that 1 in 5 people in Aurora are foreign born and they have over 160 languages. She did not agree with charging a fee for an interpreter or tripling the cost of the fee.

17. REPORTS

17.a Mayor

Mayor Coffman reminded voters to vote in November's election. He said that for those living on the Colfax Corridor between Peoria to the west, all the way to Yosemite, two blocks north on Colfax, two blocks south on Colfax, that whole corridor will have the opportunity to vote on a downtown development authority, which will not increase taxes but will allow any increase behind the threshold of current revenues to remain within the corridor to be used for improvements. He stated if someone has a residence in that corridor, they will receive a ballot; however, a business owner, lessee or property owner, will also be able to vote in

that election. He mentioned there a section at Aurora.gov that explains how to register to vote. He announced that there will be an event tomorrow, on the southwest corner of the CU Anschutz Medical Campus, for a Korean War memorial. He thanked the Korean community for raising the money for that, as well as the Adams Open Space Commission for providing a grant to fund it. He said there will also be a ribbon-cutting tomorrow for the CrossPurpose organization, which has 137 income restriction units with job training co-located, and it is a joint project with Living Hope Community Church. He said that on November 6th, the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development will do a walk-through of the Aurora Regional Navigation Center, which will be operational on November 17th.

17.b Council

CM Coombs attended a meeting with a group of community members last week, along with Mayor Coffman, who were concerned about bike and pedestrian deaths

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and injuries, appropriate enforcement and investigation of those deaths, and measures to ensure safety. She noted that there was a conversation about the small number of bicycle fatalities they see in the city year to year, but she believed that was due to people not riding bikes on the streets in the city. She hopes they continue to address the lack of appropriate infrastructure there. She thanked the community members who came to join in-person today at Paris Elementary to connect with each other and their representative, which she hopes we can also do in the near future in our space.

CM Jurinsky clarified that the recall against DA Paden has nothing to do with the Aurora budget whatsoever, as it would come out of Arapahoe County's budget. She applauded the high schoolers that called in with concern for their classmates and what they are seeing them purchase and how it affects them, as it is very serious and she appreciated CM Coombs bringing that forward. She added that she will also have an ordinance coming forward to further that and the expansion of such shops. She acknowledged a community activist caller calling for the resignation of Chief Todd Chamberlain, and she feels that Chief Chamberlain coming was long overdue in this city and he has turned morale around, even though there is still a long way to go. She added that she fully supported him and felt he has been doing a wonderful job. She thanked the callers that talked specifically about her, as every time they attack her, post about her, tag her, they help her to raise money toward her campaign, as her supporters donate to her campaign and sign up to volunteer. CM Jurinsky reported that on September 27th, from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., there will be another volunteer park cleanup event, at Delaney Farm Park. She encouraged residents to email her about any parks that they feel are not getting enough attention. She asked for donations and volunteers for the Aurora Animal Shelter.

CM Kassaw echoed CM Jurinsky's statements of the students calling in and telling them what is going on. He said the Aurora diverse community members held a lot of heritage culture events in the last couple of weeks, and he was able to attend the 2nd Korean Annual Heritage Event. He also attended the APS Gala and Taste of Ethiopia.

CM Murillo gave a shoutout to the Food Justice Festival happening on September 27th, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Paris Elementary, as it is a big collaboration between many local nonprofits and organizations trying to create food sovereignty, accessibility, affordability, and culturally relevant food. She gave a reminder that her monthly town hall will be September 25th, 6 to 7:30, at the MLK Library. She noted that if they were to have an election or recall, though Arapahoe County would initially front the money, they would still charge the city back for those costs.

CM Sundberg voiced that he, Mayor Coffman, CM Bergan, and CM Kassaw visited Sage Ridge, and he was excited about the amount of homelessness services they have coming online, and by January they will have over 900 new bed spaces, walk-in detox, and walk-in psychiatric care. He read a quote from Governor Polis made in the Denverite Magazine, in regard to looking at Denver's approach to homelessness and the mayor shifting course. He expressed that he saw Mayor Coffman at the ABC Company Fleet Operations, and stated there is an incredible need for this type of

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service. He announced that the I-70 Picadilly Interchange will open November 2nd. He attended Ethiopia Day and the Highline Canal Dinner. He echoed that he also believes Chief Chamberlain is the right man for the job.

CM Medina shared that he went to the Ethiopian Celebration on the Great Lawn, the Lalapalooza Event, and Annual Korean Community Celebration, Highline Canal Celebration, and the APS Gala for Youth Scholarships. He stated that Be Well Health and Wellness Youth Council had a submit last weekend on mental health for youth at the Village Exchange Center. He also thanked the community members who came out tonight and said it was great to be amongst the community again.

CM Hancock attended the 2nd Korean Cultural Festival, APS Banquet, and visited the Navigation Campus. She said Aurora is setting the pace on how to wholistically treat people experiencing homelessness, along with medical issues and drug addiction, which is the most compassionate way to help people be good stewards of their own lives, and it is important that we support them in that effort. She said they had Lalapalooza and hoped they could do more outdoor events next year. She mentioned that the Aurora Borealis Festival is coming up that will be out in Painted Prairie, and tickets can be purchased online. She said her understanding is that we would not spend any money for a recall effort, as the county cannot charge the city back for recall efforts. She announced that her next town hall will be on October 9th, at Noonan's. She also shared that she is appointing Joel Boyd to the Business Advisory Committee to replace Michael Hancock, who is moving to the Budget Committee. She thanked Shane Doyle for all his work on the Budget Committee.

CM Lawson thanked the Meadowood community for inviting her to their HOA meeting, where they went over issues and addressed concerns, and thanked her Heather Gardens residents for coming to her meeting. She said they will have a meeting on September 30th, with the SAVE Program there to discuss youth violence, at Central Rec Center. She stated that the Senate is set to vote on the House-passed continuing resolution on September 29th to avoid government shutdown.

CM Bergan voiced that she had a meeting representing E-470 with the Executive Director to the Transportation Legislative Review Committee, which went well, had a Planning and Economic Development Policy Committee, and attended the Sage Ridge Grand Opening, where they were able to tour the facility. She said they also had an E-470 Regular Board Meeting, IBTTA Meeting, and Region 9 Opioid Abatement Council Meeting. She attended the Southlands Wine Walk, Study Session Budget Presentation, and Water Policy Committee. She thanked Jacob Cox for coming and teaching her constituents about the development happening throughout the entire city at her town hall. She also thanked Bob Oliva for his presentation on retail.
