Staff gave a brief presentation on the item.

CM Hancock asked how long it would take for the reporting to come to fruition if this passes.

Staff stated enforcement activity would be available once the program is stood up, but it may be some time until compliance efforts plan out.

CM Hancock inquired if it would be reasonable to expect it to be 2, 3, or 4 years before they actually see data showing results of this.

Staff responded it depends on what they encounter.

CM Gardner asked for clarification that Section 6-523 of ordinance requires an annual report to City Council about the effectiveness of the ordinance.

Staff answered yes.

CM Bergan inquired what staff meant by the public health surveys not being available for years but the other data would be available.

Staff clarified.

CM Bergan expressed they can track the enforcement activity and any compliance. She inquired if the only issue is the youth trend data.

Staff answered yes.

CM Bergan asked if there was anything else missing besides the youth data trends.

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CM Gardner explained that staff is bringing up one specific report that may or may not be available, but nowhere in the resolution does it require the use of a specific reporting tool. He added there is no specific trend data required by this resolution.

CM Bergan asked if this is doable or a heavy lift with not being required to have the other data.

Staff stated they did not believe it would be a major problem presenting the data.

CM Medina made a substitute motion to continue this to the next Council Meeting, as he would like more clarification about the data piece, regarding who is gathering the data and when.

CM Coombs commented this ordinance includes a lot of stakeholding with a lot of different groups, so she would also like the ability to have the conversation about this resolution that includes perspectives of multiple stakeholders.

CM Gardner expressed it is really telling that they pass an ordinance that requires annual reporting and then when they try to define the annual reporting, all the sudden there is all this chaos. He said it tells him a lot about what the intent of the ordinance is.

CM Coombs explained the issue is not the request for specifics on the reporting, as some of the stakeholders she has spoken with have fully supported having specifics on the reporting but had questions on some of the language and making sure it is fully inclusive of all of the stakeholders, as a lot of the language only talks about what industry wants and is looking for in the ordinance. She said she would just like the opportunity to talk through how they can make the rest of the resolution more inclusive of all the stakeholders, not about whether the reporting, and specifying the reporting, is a valid request.

CM Bergan shared she is always for having more stakeholder input and felt it was extremely important that they track the data.

CM Hancock voiced she thought they had already moved forward on the ordinance and had come to a really good place with it, where they were also protecting young people and keeping in mind business concerns, but she was interested in them having valuable and good reporting around it to be sure they are being fair and equitable in terms of how young people and businesses are being impacted.

CM Andrews wished everyone a happy Women's History Month. He attended a meeting at the Opportunity Center with black civic engagement to work on a strategy to bring Ward I together and went to Aztec Tattoo in Ward I where he met with students from New America learning how to remove tattoos from gang members. He announced the Public Safety Meeting is March 12th, at 11 a.m.

MPT Coombs expressed their next At Large Town Hall Meeting will be May 5th, and wished everyone a Happy Women's History Month and International Women's Day. She attended the Casa Inmigrante Health Bazaar on March 8th, where there were over 550 screenings given, available vaccines, individuals teaching people more about healthcare providers, the consulate offices for El Salvador and Mexico in attendance, and MPT Coombs delivered a proclamation on behalf of Aurora. She stated the first meeting of the Rules Committee will be March 24th, at 5:30 p.m., in the Aurora Room. She noted there will be public comment and they will discuss the agenda items they want to have moving forward and begin the conversation on the conduct, order, and decorum of Council and the community at City Council Meetings.

CM Gardner thanked staff for supporting their Build Up Aurora ranking roundups and doing a great job explaining the projects to the public. He also thanked his colleagues that attended.

CM Horton reported she was able to tour the Real Time Information Center at APD Headquarters, and she encouraged her fellow colleagues to tour it as well. She thanked APD officers for walking her through and answering her questions. She attended the Annual Black History Month Luncheon and had her first board meeting at the Fitzsimmons Innovation Campus. She went to the State of the Region 2026 Adams County Regional Economic Partnership, where she learned a lot about energy and walked away having a lot more questions to ask and to learn when it comes to

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energy and how impacts the city. She had a scheduled town hall for this Saturday that was going to be around animal welfare, but it was postponed to an unknown date at this time. There is a follow up conversation around the Community Development Corporation on March 21st, 9:30-12:30, at the ABC Community Hub, at the old Paris Elementary School.

She was excited to work with him the entire year to learn more about Buckley Space Force Base, and she gave a shoutout to his wife, Lieutenant Colonel Anne Hughes. She attended the Black History Luncheon and reminded everyone of the free sports trial day at the Southeast Rec Center on Sunday. She also honored International Women's Day and acknowledged over 100 girls in Iran who were killed in a bombing, as well as 5-year-old Hind Rajab Hamada.

CM Medina reported that he attended the grand opening of Fire Station 9 on Saturday, as well as the unveiling of the Fast As Lighting logo they utilize, which was very well-attended by the community. He announced his town hall will be March 10th, where he will have discussions on code and housing.

CM Hancock shared her town hall is Thursday, at Noonans, where they will start with networking from 6 to 6:30 and the meeting following, featuring PROS, discussing Utah Park and the pool and the updates they are doing there. She said she will be attending State of the Base this week. She went to Aurora Singers on Saturday, and they honored Irene Chase. CM Lawson announced she has a town hall tomorrow at Central Rec Center, 6:30-8 and one on March 21st, at Heather Gardens, at 10 a.m.

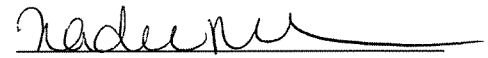
Mayor Coffman adjourned the regular meeting of City Council.
