11.a.1 Aurora Police Department (APD) and Aurora U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Processing Center (AIPC) Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

Staff gave a brief presentation on the item.

MPT Coombs asked what kind of information was being shared and if there is any protection for personal information and First Amendment rights when it talks about sharing information in the event of civil disturbance and protest in the memorandum of understanding (MOU).

Staff answered the sharing of information is similar to information given when calling 911 in order for APD to respond and best protect the detainees, officers, and those working at the Geo facility.

MPT Coombs inquired if personal information about members of the public who are participating in protests could be gathered and used for intelligence with federal officers as a part of this.

Staff explained the part about protests in the MOU was regarding making sure everyone around the facility are safe, including protestors, and APD is not going out and gathering information.

Chief Chamberlain voiced the MOU is no deviation from the prior MOU, as it just gives them more authority to have stronger guardrails in place that do not get them pulled into environments they do not want not be in. It also talks about the approach of an incident command

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system if they have an individual escape and how they handle it. He added there is nothing in the MOU that changes or modifies anything regarding First Amendment rights or how they would respond at any other gathering.

CM Jackson asked how the emergency resolution just passed regarding APD's cooperation with ICE works with this MOU, as they explicitly stated they wanted to limit cooperation.

Chief Chamberlain responded this was not about a relationship or partnership with ICE, but about community safety. He stated they are not supporting ICE and are not involved in immigration enforcement in any way. He said the Geo facility holds approximately 1,000 people, - two-thirds of which have criminal issues related to them not including federal immigration.

CM Horton asked where he was getting his information that two-thirds of the people in the facility have criminal charges not related to the civil undocumented charge.

Chief Chamberlain responded he got that information from the ICE director, but he could probably pull more data for the exact number.

MPT Coombs asked if some of those crimes included being picking up by APD for things like shoplifting and trespassing.

Chief Chamberlain answered it could be any misdemeanor or felony crime.

CM Horton thanked the public for coming to speak on this item. She felt APD has had more robust conversations with the Geo Detention Center than anyone else, including elected officials, and the numbers given by the Geo Facility are very concerning and do not align with data reported by many advocates, nonprofit services organizations, lawyers, and their government counterparts. She said this MOU does not speak well of the city being able to have the amount of details and a true understanding between two entities, especially one that seems very untrustworthy.

MPT Coombs voiced she wanted them to continue to look at the argument Geo, as a contractor of the federal government, can exercise the full authority of the federal government, as there seems to be some cases that undermine that argument they should look into. She

stated as a Council, they should be doing everything in their power to stop the situations and conditions the community has presented.

CM Lawson asked CM Wiles why she wanted to continue this item.

CM Wiles answered she has gotten dozens of emails, 30 social media messages, and a ton of voicemails against this. She reached out to one of the developers and told them there seems to be a lot of questions still in the community, and they agreed to hold a joint virtual

meeting on the 29th, to make sure those questions are answered and people have their voices heard on it.

CM Bergan noted the developer did outreach to the community with several town halls, a newsletter, going to management and finance policy committee meeting, going to Study Session, and then had a first reading. She wondered what other information could be given to the residents on this.

P. Schulte stated he did not know what could come up before the next meeting, but if Council supports continuing it, that is appropriate.

CM Bergan voiced they already approved the ARI, FRIA, with the different tiers, so she wondered how this would affect the service plan.

Staff responded this is simply deferring the second reading of the ordinance approving the service plan agreement for the Painted Prairie Metropolitan District.

CM Bergan felt maybe the residents were not understanding the tax implications for the ARI, which would allow the different developers to build out 56th Avenue, which needs to be improved so the King Soopers can go in. She said the residents are anxious to get a grocery store in their area, so she did not understand the delay.

CM Wiles answered the delay is because she represents the community and they have reached out to say they are not comfortable with it, so she is going to give them the information they need to be comfortable so they can move forward. She added not everybody had time to attend the weekday M&F or HOA meetings that were held previously.

18. REPORTS

18.a Mayor

Mayor Coffman thanked CM Lawson for her leadership as the Chair of the FSIR Committee and organizing the trip, as well as Liz Rogers. He had a town hall meeting last Saturday, where they had a presentation from Aurora Water on the drought situation. He expressed he normally posts updates on his Facebook page.

18.b Council

CM Andrews directed everyone to his social media for updates and statements.

MPT Coombs reported she had meetings about the Cherry Creek Basin Water Quality Authority and Mile High Flood District last week, which both included approvals of projects that benefit Aurora. She also attended the Public Defender Open House, participated in the Aurora Art and Public Places MLK Library art public selection process. She expressed they will have a Rules Committee Meeting in the Aurora Room on May 11th, at 6 p.m., to listen to the community on things they want to bring forward regarding how to approach decorum among Council, between Council and the community, and the community themselves. She shared they had an update on the ADA Chambers on April 1st, and a subsequent update, that the city started working with the contractor to draw up new plans and that community and public engagement will be part of the planning process. She mentioned Columbine happened 27 years ago, which at the time motivated her to come together with her peers and some adults to organize events and participate in the community to educate about interpersonal violence, the root, and how to stop it, which ultimately led to her connecting with other people opposing structural and systemic violence, including movement against war and killings by police. She said it is interesting they are still looking to create that same oversight and address the same issues now.

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CM Jackson met with partner Denver-Aurora Community Action Committee, who meet every Wednesday at 7 p.m. She gave a shoutout to Accessibility Consulting Partners, the consultant they are working with regarding the accessibility update. She announced the Rules Committee will be May 11th, at 6 p.m., which will include a decorum listening session, and she encouraged those who want to speak on that subject to show up to attend. She also gave a shoutout to the youth and children that came to the meeting today to speak about the Aurora SAVES Program, and stated children and youth are a marginalized body of people, as there are not a lot of ways for them to organize and use their voice to impact systematic change.

CM Horton attended the Public Defenders Open House, Fitzsimmons Board Meeting, which had good ideas on how to utilize the existing land, the Aurora Chamber of Commerce Banquet, and was invited to learn about Senior Planet Colorado, whose mission is to educate and provide technical services for seniors. She announced her Ward I Town Hall, at the MLK Library, where they will have presentations from the Save the Aurora Reservoir Group, a Consent Decree update and the Independent Monitor retrospective summary, and the Police Area Representatives (PAR). She added they are having a Know Your Rights Training, on May 7th, from 6-7 p.m., at the ABC Community Hub.

CM Wiles reported she was present at the Chamber Event and had a meeting with Denver Council Member Stacie Gilmore to talk about the Navigation Center and how to partner better on that. She expressed there were 13 lives lost at Columbine, as well as subsequent lives lost due to suicide or long term injury from that shooting, but she felt they have not learned a lot since then. She said youth is showing up at their meetings and every day that they go to school it could be a warzone, so the adults need to do better by them. She expressed there are many great volunteer opportunities coming up, including the Highline Canal walking series and cleanup days, the Walls project, tree planting on April 26th, and work at Ponderosa Elementary on the 22nd. She gave a shoutout to the Aurora Tidal Waves swimming team for their performance at the Special Olympics Swimming Event. She noted there are more Special Olympics events coming up that are in need of volunteers.

CM Hancock announced April 19th through April 25th is National Library Week, and encouraged everyone to take advantage of the pamphlets on that, as there are so many cool and free things going on throughout the library. She stated there are organizations that do amazing things with young people, including Colorado Uplift, which is a community organization that helps empower young people through sports, wellness, opportunities, fitness, character education, leadership development, and long term mentoring, who have programs available right now. She added another great organization in Aurora is The Road Called Strate, who deal with empowering at-risk youths to be good stewards of their own lives. She received a quilt of valor from the Quilt of Valor Foundation, who recognize veterans for service, which was an amazing honor and one of the highlights of her life. She noted the quilts are hand-made and take over 40 hours of work, and they have given over 40,000 quilts to veterans across the country. She expressed she will be reading and painting rocks

with the children at Meadowood Child Development Center this week and will be celebrating the opening of their brand new play park at the school.

CM Medina reported he was able to do a cleanup at the DeLaney Farm with a church group, and was accompanied by his daughter and grandchildren. He looked forward to doing more of those in the future.

CM Lawson thanked all the residents that attended her meeting at Heather Gardens. She said her next meeting is tomorrow, at 6:30 p.m., at Mission Viejo, where they will have detention and court administration there. She shared that she, Mayor Coffman, CM Hancock, and CM Bergan went to Washington D.C. to advocate for their priorities and two congressionally directed spending projects. She noted they talked to Congressman Crow, Senator Bennett, Senator Hickenlooper, Congresswoman Boebert's Office, and Congressman Gabe Evans. She added they also went to HUD and the Annex of the White House, and talked to some of the administration there. She voiced it is important they got Aurora's name out there, as they have a lot of advocacy at the federal government in their congressionally directed spending and specific projects. She thanked Mayor Coffman and her fellow council members for participating in that trip.

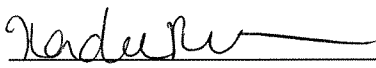
