Council Member Cleland expressed her excitement over the partnership with two other entities for the building of the DNA lab facility.

Nancy Rodgers, Senior Assistant City Attorney, provided a brief summary of the item.

Police Chief Nicholas Metz, Aurora Police, discussed the existing DNA process and how this facility would expedite investigation results.

Council Member Richardson stated the facility was located in Douglas County and requested City staff who worked there be provided compensation in the form of mileage or a vehicle.

Council Member Roth discussed his involvement with the item, noting the model was the Jefferson County Regional Laboratory. He stated his support of the item, noting he looked forward to this being a very successful venture.

Ms. Rodgers made Council aware of a small footnote amendment to Exhibit A made by Arapahoe County that put forth the exact square footage of the planned crime lab at 25,000 square feet.

Council Member Roth pointed out Council made a conscious decision to use a portion of the retail marijuana sales money for visible amenities for the citizens and this was one of them.

Council Member Richardson expressed concerns regarding marijuana sales revenue in general and expressed his hope that the City Manager was closely monitoring the tax revenue that flowed from that source. He asked that City Council be provided semi-annual reports in that regard.

Mayor Hogan opened the public hearing on the item.

Sarah Wieder, Planner II, gave a presentation on the item, noting it related to the rezone of 26 acres from PD-MF/COMM (Planned Development - Multi-Family / Commercial District) to SIR (Sustainable Infill and Redevelopment District) to facilitate the development of a mixed-use, master planned development on Colfax Avenue between Sable Boulevard and Chambers Road.

Matt Runyon, representing the applicant, gave a presentation on the item.

Council Member LeGare asked if the green space depicted on the conceptual drawing was the gulch than ran through the property and if it was a flood plain. Mr. Runyon answered affirmatively, noting the applicant worked with civil engineers and architects to mitigate that concern.

Mayor Pro Tem Lawson asked the proposed price point for the townhome product. Mr. Runyon stated the anticipated population was primarily those working at the Fitzsimons, UC Health and Children's Hospital campuses, noting the price points would most likely not be below \$250k.

Council Member Bergan stated her support of the item, noting the importance of serving the veteran population's needs.

Mayor Hogan closed the public hearing on the item.

Terri Velasquez, Finance Director, stated this was the refinance of an original debt note for Murphy Creek Golf Course from 1995, noting there were ten years left on the debt and this refinance would reduce the interest rate from four percent to two percent, thereby realizing a savings of approximately \$400k to Golf Enterprise over that time.

Trevor Vaughn, Manager of Tax & Licensing, Finance, provided a brief summary of the item, noting it related to the state law that allowed for common consumption areas. He stated this allowed licensed establishments to sell beverages and then allow them to go off the licensed premises into a common area, noting this ordinance adopted the framework to do so.

Council Member Richardson expressed appreciation to Council Member Berzins for her efforts in bringing the item forward.

Council Member LeGare stated he would not support the item because it set a bad precedent by allowing the City Council to decide where a stop sign should be placed despite the Traffic Engineering department's recommendations.

Council Member Bergan stated her support of the item, noting that while standards were in place for a reason and should be adhered to, there were rare occasions of exception. She stated this ordinance provided the City Council, as a Home Rule City, the ability to deal with those exceptions. She noted approval would still require a majority vote and she did not think it would be abused.

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Council Member Cleland stated the Uniform Traffic Code was just words on a paper and sometimes it was necessary to choose logic over those words. She noted this ordinance gave City Council the opportunity to do what they were elected to do which was to work for their constituents.

Mayor Pro Tem Lawson stated she would support the item because it was a public safety issue.

Council Member Richardson referenced the words '*including litigation if necessary*' in the ordinance and asked if approval of the ordinance allowed for litigation or if staff would return to City Council prior to any litigation.

Kenneth S. Fellman, Kissinger & Fellman, PC, assured City Council that staff would not initiate any litigation without coming back to Council.

Council Member Bergan stated it was an intent to acquire and Council would be provided status reports on the project.

Mr. Fellman concurred.

13. **PLANNING MATTERS**

- ◆ a. Public Hearing to Consider a Waiver for the height of a monopole to extend to 129 feet for a cell tower for the project known as T-Mobile CMRS at Specialty Wood Products, generally located at the Southwest Corner of E 22nd Avenue and Tower Road (18370 E 22nd Avenue). (Case Number-2006-6019-01). STAFF SOURCE: Jonathan Woodward, Planner, Planning & Development Services

Mayor Hogan opened the public hearing on the item.

John Wabiszczewicz II, Manager, Engineering Department, T-Mobile, representing the applicant, provided a summary of the item.

Mayor Hogan expressed his understanding that the applicant was requesting a deferral of the item, noting if so, the applicant would need to ask for one with a date certain if needed.

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Council Member Richardson asked if there was any opposition to the item. Mr. Wabiszczewicz answered no. Council Member Richardson stated in that case, he did not see why the item could not move forward.

Mr. Wabiszczewicz stated the applicant's intent to proceed.

Jonathan Woodward, Planner, Planning & Development Services, gave a presentation on the item, noting it related to a height waiver that was denied by the Planning & Zoning Commission.

Council Member Bergan stated her appreciation for the applicant's investment in the City and asked staff to speak to the applicant's response regarding the City's request to mitigate visual impacts. Mr. Woodward did so, noting there were not any proposals by the applicant to mitigate the impact of the additional height of the cell tower. Council Member Bergan asked why that was so. Mr. Woodward stated the applicant contended it would be difficult to provide buffering given the additional height, noting the applicant would provide fencing around the tower either way. Council Member Bergan stated her understanding that buffering would be difficult given the tower height and asked if there was any discussion regarding putting the tower on top of a building. Mr. Woodward stated the applicant cited their reasoning for not doing so was due to the need for greater increased coverage by the additional height of the tower.

Council Member Richardson asked if any neighbors attended the Planning Commission meeting in opposition. Mr. Woodward answered no. Council Member Richardson asked the distance to the closest occupied resident to this site. Mr. Woodward stated approximately 500 feet to the east. Council Member Richardson asked if those residents were given notice of the public hearing. Mr. Woodward answered affirmatively.

Council Member LeGare asked the maximum allowable height for the tower. Mr. Woodward stated 60 feet.

Council Member Cleland stated she did not have a problem with the tower because it was proposed to be located in the middle of the site with nothing around it and it was proposed to be co-locatable. She noted there were still dead zones in the City of Aurora and it was her assumption that this would mitigate that issue.

Curtis Linville, RF Design Engineering Contractor, T-Mobile, discussed the reasons why the height waiver was being requested, noting it enhanced services in the area due to the population density in the area.

Council Member LeGare stated his appreciation that the T-Mobile data center was located in the City and asked if the tower was unrelated to the data center other than T-Mobile's ownership of the site. Mr. Linville answered no, noting while the tower did provide coverage to businesses and residents in the area, it could also be used as a back hall hub because of its switching facility.

Council Member Bergan expressed appreciation to the applicant for the presentation.

Council Member LeGare asked Mr. Linville to speak to what exactly the applicant was willing to do to allow competitors to co-locate on the tower in terms of tower and ground space and asked what general criterion was required to be added to the site plan to make it enforceable. Mr. Linville did so, noting it has become an industry standard to co-locate on towers in an attempt to reduce the number of required facilities providing coverage. He stated the additional height provided adequate space both on the tower and in the large parking lot for co-location. Council Member LeGare stated the 60 feet height would still be a benefit to the co-locators.

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Mr. Linville concurred.

Council Member LeGare asked staff what would be required in terms of the site plan to address and require the co-location opportunity.

Mike Hyman, City Attorney, stated doing so would require a motion with a condition that required the applicant to consider co-location on their tower.

Council Member Cleland noted the applicant has stated on the record that they would do so and adding a condition to the approval appeared to be redundant.

Mayor Hogan pointed out the item was a height waiver and not a site plan, noting adding the language was additional coverage.

Council Member Cleland stated her understanding that an applicant's commitment made at a City Council meeting went with the application. She noted, however, she would be happy to make a motion with the condition that the applicant consider co-location.

Council Member Richardson stated government should not tell the applicant that they shall accommodate a competitor's devices, noting the condition could state the applicant should consider co-location. He stated that was the role of private industry and not government.

Council Member LeGare stated the applicant pointed out in the backup material that co-location was a possibility for this site, noting the applicant made rental income from co-location. He pointed out code enforcement, the courts and the Planning department enforced these issues and they used the site plan to do so.

Council Member Bergan stated she did not agree with dictating to businesses what they should do, noting it should be their decision to do so.

Mayor Hogan pointed out the public hearing was still open and was not the place for debate. He closed the public hearing on the item.

Motion by Cleland, second by Mounier to approve item 13a and to strongly encourage co-location.

Council Member LeGare stated he was initially very skeptical about supporting the item, noting however, that the applicant's comment related to the higher tower being associated with the data center made the waiver appropriate. He supported the language that strongly encouraged co-location, noting not doing so after all of the debate would significantly damage the applicant's reputation.

Council Member Pierce discussed coverage maps in the backup material and stated he would not support the item because the 60 foot tower complied with code and filled in over half of the dead spots, the existing cell towers in the City that exceeded the height allowed by code were grandfathered in and did not go through the approval process and lastly, approval of a height waiver would set precedence for other companies to make the same request.

Council Member Roth asked staff to speak to the neighborhood outreach for this item. Mr. Woodward did so, noting notices were sent out to the five adjacent HOAs and neighborhood meetings were encouraged by staff. He stated the applicant declined to host the meetings. He expressed concerns related to approving the item when the Ward II council member was not present to offer insight into conversations she might have had with the neighbors.

Council Member Berzins stated her support of the item, noting it was a public safety issue.

She noted she attended the Mission Viejo and Saddle Rock HOA meetings and expressed appreciation for their invitations to learn about their issues.

Council Member Roth echoed the other council members' comments regarding Ms. Goldman and her contributions to the City. He announced the Ward V Town Hall meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, February 21, 2017 at 6:00 p.m. at the Heather Gardens clubhouse where the topics of discussion would be marijuana and the impact of retail sales of marijuana on the City of Aurora and the future of the Regatta Plaza redevelopment.

Council Member LeGare offered kudos to Ms. Goldman, noting she did an exemplary job in the City and wished her all the best in her retirement. He discussed a business tour he took at the veteran-owned company, Techno Rescue.

Council Member Cleland expressed appreciation to Ms. Goldman for her great work and efforts in giving the City of Aurora a fantastic reputation, noting many other cities look to the City of Aurora because of her leadership and the things she has done outside of the City in other groups. She wished Ms. Goldman luck in her retirement.

Council Member Pierce expressed appreciation to Ms. Goldman for the great work she has done for the City and to Mayor Hogan for this efforts at the recent Mayors Economic Forum.

Council Member Berzins expressed appreciation to Ms. Goldman for everything she has done for the City and wished her luck on the next phase of her life, noting she would be missed. She expressed appreciation to Dr. Barbara Shannon-Bannister, Council Member Peterson and Pastors Reed Hettich and Greg McDonald for their efforts with regards to the MLK Jr. birthday celebrations. She discussed her experience with verifying the largest collection of Adventures in Odyssey original memorabilia for the Guinness Book of World Records at the home of Dan Klein.
